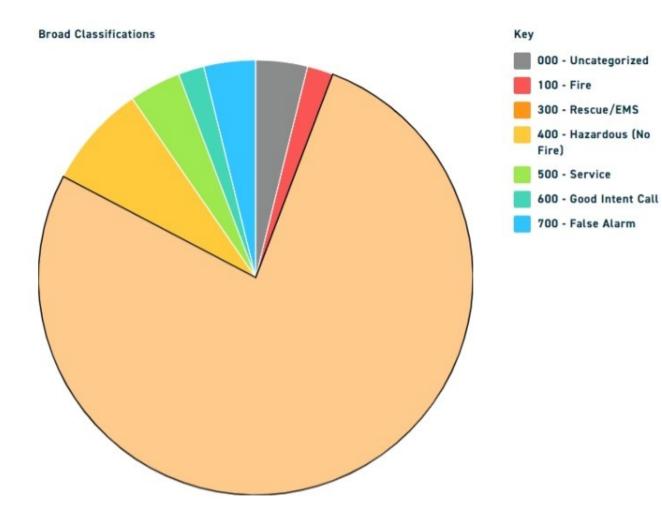

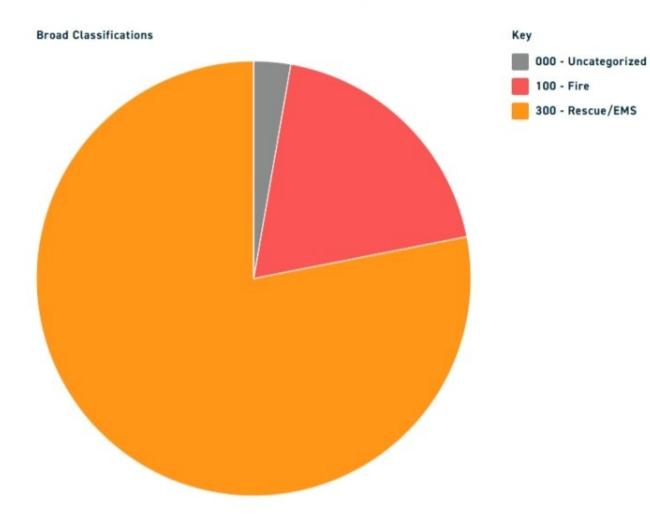

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The August 2025 operation and maintenance summary report for the Alpena Township water and wastewater systems is provided for your review. All required monitoring was performed in the water system for this period. A copy of the distribution system Monthly Operating Report (MOR) is provided for the Board's review in Attachment C.

Maintenance Allowance expenditures for the contract year September 2024 – August 2025 total \$124,413.01. A copy of the Maintenance Allowance report is included in <u>Attachment B</u>.

A tabulation of all water and sewer Work Orders completed through August 2025 is provided in Attachment A.

#### **OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS**

August 6 – FVOP staff worked with Bedrock Construction to replace a leaking water service line at 1395 Hamilton Road. Staff replaced the leaking water service with 3/4" K-type copper.

August 11 – Collected UCMR5 samples at the Mich-E-Ke-Wis Park. FVOP staff are required to collect samples quarterly for the EPA for one year. This is sample three (3) of four (4).

August 14 - FVOP staff received a call from central dispatch for a fire hydrant that would not shut down after being used by firefighters. FVOP staff responded and shut off the fire hydrant at the auxiliary valve located right before the fire hydrant.

August 17 - FVOP staff were called out for an emergency MissDig called in by DTE to replace a leaking gas service line

August 20 - FVOP staff worked with MacArthur Construction to replace a broken curb-box at 2568 US-23 South. Staff were able to replace the curb-box install a new stem, exercise the curb-stop before a contractor paved over the curb-box.

August 22 - FVOP staff worked at the three (3) can lift stations to replace all seal filters.

August 23 - FVOP staff were called out to 910 Golf course Road for having no water pressure at the home. Upon arrival staff confirmed that no water was coming into the home. Staff could not immediately locate a leak. Staff scheduled to have the service line excavated the next working day with Bedrock Construction.

August 25 - FVOP staff worked with Bedrock Construction for the water leak at 910 Golf Course Road. Staff found that the service line for 910 Golf Course was tapped off a 6" watermain that went into a privately owned lot. Staff replaced the broken service line and installed a new curb-stop in the private lot. Staff also worked with Bedrock Construction to install a new 1" service line off the 12" water main in Golf Course Road to feed 910 Golf Course Road. This allowed the home to have water service restored and be in compliance with the township's ordinance.

#### **ADOPTION OF AGENDA**

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to adopt the agenda, supported by L. Dehring. Motion passed.

#### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to approve the June 9, 2025 minutes, supported by R. Brown. Motion passed.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT** – None

#### **CORRESPONDENCE**

a. Report #02-25 - R. Deuell

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to file all correspondence along with Rick Deuell's Addendum to Report #02-25, supported by R. Brown. Motion passed.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING**

1. <u>Case #P-02-25</u>, Mark Mellingen Jr, requested a REZONE for property located at 1245 Greenhaven Lane from a One-Family Residential district (R-1) to an Agricultural district (A), Parcel No. 012-029-000-799-00.

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to open the public hearing, supported by L. Dehring. Motion passed.

Mr. Mellingen was present to address the commission. Chairperson Hilberg stated that a letter was received from Mr. Mellingen requesting a conditional rezone instead of a rezone. Mr. Mellingen explained he felt that a conditional rezone would better describe what he wants to achieve. He applied for a farm permit through EGLE and talked to them about invasive species that is on his property such as autumn olive and buckthorn which makes the property impassible. His old farm used to have apple and other fruit trees which he would like to plant here. In order to afford that, he wants to rezone the property agricultural because there are a number of grants available. He will leave any mature trees around the perimeter but will have the rest removed or ground down. He already spoke to EGLE and they approved grinding the trees down without removing the roots in areas deemed wetlands. If he wants to put sand around the base of the trees, EGLE will grant him a permit. He stated that he is also required to drain water off the property and after putting culverts in, the water drains off the road better than before. His intention is to clear and plant grass this year then plant the apple trees in the spring. L. Dehring asked how long it takes to get a grant. Mr. Mellingen responded that there are multiple state and federal grants but he cannot apply for them until the property is zoned agricultural so has not pursued those yet. Chairperson Hilberg pointed out that trees may be planted in an R-1 zone but the only reason Mr. Mellingen was pursuing a rezone was to be eligible for grants. Mr. Mellingen confirmed that statement then added that 200-300 trees at \$150 each was a lot of money.

Rachel Smolinski of 1550 Greenhaven Lane voiced her opposition to the rezone and read her letter to the commission listing five reasons why (see attached).

Chairperson Hilberg pointed out that as stated earlier, if that area is wetlands, it is not up to the planning commission to decide if fruit trees can be planted there or not. Only the conditional rezone is in their control. R. Smolinski reapproached the commission and added that if the property gets rezoned to agricultural, it will impact Mr. Mellingen's ability to fill in wetlands because it is easier to get a permit through EGLE when zoned that way.

Davy Beaudoin of 1318 Pebble Street pointed out that if the concern is flooding, Mr. Mellingen has put in drainage to clean out flooding from certain areas and it is way better since he moved there. He added that you cannot stop him from planting trees, the rezone would just make it easier for him to obtain grants. His only concern is that it not be a farm with cows but rather apple orchards and he has no problem with the rezone.

Patricia Garant of 1104 Greenhaven Lane commented on a strip of land owned by the county that acts as buffer and wanted to make sure it would stay. She is concerned with disturbing the balance of the wetlands that serve a purpose and keep their home from flooding.

Greg Weiland of 1102 Greenhaven Lane is concerned that if Mr. Mellingen moves in five years that the next people who move in might have cattle or such because of the rezone.

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to close the public comment, supported by L. Dehring. Motion passed.

Chairperson Hilberg reviewed the following options for voting. To approve the conditional rezone as is, deny the conditional rezone, approve with more conditions or table. He read an excerpt from Rick Deuell's Findings of Fact report that if the planning commission chooses to approve with the conditions offered by the applicant, the offered conditions should be included as a statement of record in the planning commission motion.

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to not recommend the conditional rezone request to the Board of Trustees for the following reasons, supported by R. Brown:

- a. A rezone is not required to plant trees.
- b. There is concern of future use in an agricultural zone.
- c. The soil is not conducive for growing fruit trees.

Roll call vote: R. Brown-aye; L. Dehring-aye; T. Hilberg-aye; M. Palevich-absent; D. Pauly-absent; J. Stender-aye; and M. Woodruff-aye. Motion passed unanimously.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

#### 1. Form CIP Committee

Discussion: Supervisor Kaszubowski reviewed the need to form a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) committee that she and Michele Palevich were spearheading. Because Michele was absent, she gave the option of tabling any business. Michele and herself would be committee members appointed by the Board of Trustees and two members of the Planning Commission would be appointed as well. There is no need to wait for the master plan to be completed.

Vice-chairperson Woodruff made a motion to table the formation of the Capital Improvement Plan committee until the September meeting, supported by J. Stender. Motion passed.

#### **DISCUSSION**

Master Plan – Heather Runyan, NEMCOG

Supervisor Kaszubowski spoke on behalf of Heather in her absence. Herself and Vice-chairperson Woodruff met with others at the county wide joint master plan group to discuss the first five chapters of the master plan. The entire county including the county, all townships and the city were able to come together and work towards this goal. A master plan survey was developed with a goal to receive 10% feedback from the entire county yet only 1% was received so it was decided to extend the survey deadline 6-8 weeks or whatever is necessary. She expressed how important it is for the planning commission members to reach out to residents asking them to partake in the survey. The survey is the driving force and foundation of the joint master plan. The survey is available on the township website, the township Facebook page, paper copies and there is also a scannable QR code that links to the survey.

Re: Opposition to Proposed Conditional Rezoning – 1245 Greenhaven Lane (Parcel #012-029-000-799-00)

Dear Members of the Planning Commission,

We are writing to respectfully oppose the proposed conditional rezoning of property owned by Mr. Mark Mellingen Jr. at 1245 Greenhaven Lane from the current **One-Family Residential District (R-1)** to **Agricultural District (A)**. We reside at 1550 Greenhaven Lane and, along with two other neighbors, hold a legal easement for access to our properties via the gravel portion of Greenhaven Lane, which traverses Mr. Mellingen's property.

### 1. The proposed activities do not require rezoning; future impacts of a rezoning are detrimental to the area

The applicant has stated an interest in planting fruit trees and removing autumn olive. As noted in the Planning Consultant's report and in his own letter, these activities are permissible under current R-1 zoning and do not require an Agricultural zoning classification. A rezoning would permanently expand the range of permitted and special uses on this property far beyond fruit cultivation, introducing numerous potential uses listed in the Agricultural District ordinance—such as agricultural product processing, commercial event facilities, kennels, marihuana growing, racetracks, and utility-scale solar or wind installations—that are incompatible with the surrounding single-family residential neighborhood.

#### 2. Wetlands and Part 303 regulated areas

A majority of the subject property, including the proposed orchard location, lies within a **Part 303 regulated wetland** as identified on the State of Michigan maps and qualifies for multiple reasons including being located within 500 feet of an inland lake, pond, river or stream and is a wetland greater than 5 acres in size. This wetland area is hydrologically connected to Sunrise (Mud) Lake and ultimately to Lake Huron.

Under Part 303 of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act (NREPA), activities such as filling, dredging, draining, or altering the hydrology of a regulated wetland require a permit from the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE). Planting fruit trees in this area would likely necessitate substantial filling and drainage, which could alter the hydrology on both the subject parcel and adjacent properties.

#### 3. Flooding and hydrology concerns

Greenhaven Lane already experiences periodic flooding several times per year. Alterations to the

wetland area—such as filling for orchard planting—would increase stormwater runoff and exacerbate flooding on the road and surrounding parcels. This would directly impact our ability, and that of our neighbors, to access our properties via our shared legal easement as well as potentially cause flooding to adjacent parcels.

#### 4. Autumn Olive considerations

While there may be some autumn olive present on upland portions of the parcel, wetland and hydric soils are not suitable for the growth of autumn olive. Altering these areas through filling and other activities could unintentionally increase invasive plant issues, not resolve them.

#### 5. Incompatibility with surrounding zoning and land use

The surrounding area is uniformly zoned One-Family Residential and is characterized by small-lot, single-family homes. Agricultural zoning allows for a broad set of commercial, recreational, and industrial-intensity uses that are wholly inconsistent with the established residential character and inconsistent with the Township's 2017 Master Plan, which designates the area for waterfront and one-family residential uses.

#### Conclusion

We urge the Planning Commission to deny this rezoning request. The applicant's stated goals can be achieved under the current zoning without exposing the neighborhood to the far-reaching and incompatible uses allowed under Agricultural zoning. Moreover, the environmental constraints and potential flooding impacts make this property ill-suited for any development that would require significant alteration of regulated wetlands.

Further, Mr. Mellingen moved to this property only about a year ago knowing the current zoning and allowable uses. A zoning ordinance's primary purpose is to regulate land use within by dividing it into districts and specifying the types of development permitted in each zone. This helps to prevent incompatible land uses in the same area and ensures a cohesive and functional community. Again, we urge you to maintain the subject property as the current **One-Family Residential District (R-1).**

Regarding: Experience with Abbi Kaszubowski Township Supervisor

We have Three contiguous parcels of land in Alpena Township, each with their own Tax ID Number. There have been instances when the House that we occupy, has been placed on one of the other parcels, which are small sized. This has resulted in the smaller parcel, becoming the main property, thus generating a Tax Bill for a building not located on the small sized property. Once generated the Tax Bill was erroneous, and required a hearing to get resolved.

It was decided to combine the Three separate tax ID numbers into a Single tax ID number. I went to see Abbi Kaszubowski about doing this. She sat and listened, looked up the parcels to be sure that they would qualify for this. After completing her search, and finding that this could be done, she provided the necessary Forms that were required, and gave detailed instructions on how to fill them out, and get them processed.

After completing the Forms and signing them, she directed us to the County Treasurer's Office to make sure the Taxes were current. The Form was taken back to the Township Supervisor, who indicated that they were correctly executed, and then provided us with an envelope to send to the Assessors Office in Rogers City. A new Tax ID Number was issued and sent to us.

Abbi stressed the importance of brining the new Tax ID number in for her to review, and fill out a new Homestead Tax Exemption Form, and forward that to the Assessor's Office to be entered on the date of the new Tax ID Number. She called the Assessor's Office in Rogers City to verify that the New Tax ID Number would not be activated until July 1, 2026, and until that time the three parcel's Tax ID would be the billable Tax still having the Homestead Tax Exemption on it.

All of this took Hours to complete. The Supervisor was kind, patient, and took great efforts to smooth out this process and treat us like Royalty. Thanks, Abbie.

#### **APPROVAL OF CONSENT AGENDA AND MINUTES**

Moved by Director Gilmet and supported by Director Thomson to approve the May 29, 2025 Minutes and Consent Agenda. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

#### 2024 NMMMA AUDIT BY STRALEY LAMP & KRAENZLEIN, PC

Chelsea Meeder from Straley Lamp & Kraenzlein presented the NMMMA 2024 audit report.

During 2024, the expenses for NMMMA were \$639,659.00 while revenues from all sources totaled \$846,642.00, resulting in an increase of net position of \$206,983.00.

Net position of NMMMA's business-type activities was at \$670,374.00 at December 31, 2024. Unrestricted net position, the part of net position that could be used to finance day-to- day activities, ended the year with a deficit of \$6,168.00, which was an increase of \$98,095.00 from December 31, 2023.

At the end of fiscal year 2024, NMMMA reported capital assets with a historical cost of \$498,455.00 and accumulated depreciation and amortization of \$70,843.00, resulting in net capital assets of \$427,612.00. This reflects an increase of approximately \$316,000.00 from 2023. A new roll-off truck was purchased and entered into a new lease agreement for a piece of land. This resulted in capital asset additions of \$385,429.00, which was offset by \$55,429.00 of depreciation, leading to the increase in capital assets from 2023. As of December 31, 2024, NMMMA has outstanding debt from a line of credit of \$30,000.00 and a lease liability of \$129,601.00. During 2024, NMMMA entered a new lease agreement, resuliting in an initial lease liability of \$132,415.00.

NMMMA substantially decreased the deficit of the unrestricted net position in 2024, and it is expected to be fully eliminated in 2025. Straley Lamp & Kraenzlein recommends NMMMA's Board continue to monitor a plan to eliminate the deficit. It is recommended that written documentation of internal controls for all key transaction cycles and financial administrative duties be put into place. The written policies and procedures manuals must be adopted by the Board. A written policy also needs to be put into place concerning Credit Card transactions according to Public Act 266 of 1955. Reviewing statutory requirements and internal needs regarding written policies and procedures are recommended to strengthen the internal control system within the NMMMA.

Moving forward a question was presented by Acting-Chair/Treasurer Smolinski concerning the cost to have the audit done in the future. Chelsea Meeder stated that it depended upon the amount extra hours that would be needed to complete it.

Moved by Director LaHaie and supported by Director Stephan to receive and file the 2024 NMMMA Audit Report by Straley Lamp & Kraenzlein, PC. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

#### **BOOKKEEPER AGREEMENT UPDATE**

Treasurer Smolinski said an agreement with Lindsey Roberts from Radiant Bookkeeping was made at \$60.00 an hour. Treasurer Smolinski stated that she is pleased with her work and would have her come to a Board meeting in the near future to go over everything as we get into construction. Ms. Roberts will check with Executive Director Barr and specifics will be reflected in the July 2025 report. Treasurer Smolinski stated that no motion is needed at this time regarding this matter.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT**

#### **Recyclables:**

Executive Director Barr presented the sale of recyclables for 2024 and through June of 2025:

Executive Director Barr stated that there is a big market for paper and cardboard and that the value for recycled paper and cardboard would be going up. There is typically one load per month of plastic and it takes awhile to get a load's worth. At this point in time the sale on plastics and metal is at a break-even point but at the new facility it will be better. Aluminum and tin were hauled independently on a pick up truck in 2024 but were a combined load for 2025.

#### **Clover Sales Report:**

Executive Director Barr stated that sales from Clover from January through July 14, 2025 were \$29,809.40. Some of the sales categories are unspecified and he stated that a new system would need to be put in place once the new facility opens.

#### **MOA Landfill Hauling:**

In 2024, NMMMA spent \$30,000.00 in waste removal using GFL. Through the end of June only \$1,270.00 has been spent. Fuel and personnel is now minimal with this process. Treasurer Smolinski stated that another payment should be received by the end of July 2025.

#### **Glass Recycling Update:**

Executive Director Barr stated that the first shipments of glass to Amrize went on June 18th and it went very well. Contamination was minimal. He stated also that the income per bin is \$200.00. Executive Director Barr was working on setting up an ACH account for easier transmission of funds and getting away from checks being written for services.

#### **Bobcat Decision:**

A decision to continue leasing the Bobcat for \$480.00 per month was made by the Executive Committee in June 2025. When NMMMA is ready, they can stop the lease with a 30-day notice.

#### **losco County Update:**

Executive Director Barr had a meeting planned with Allisa and Jamie representing losco County on July 17th to discuss ordering of bins, start date, and placement of bins. In previous conversations Bailey stated that four (4) extra bins would be purchased. Discussion of placement of bins was to be discussed. A possible option would be in Oscoda at the Whittemore School. All sites will be fully-manned and instead of making random trips Executive Director Barr would be notified when bins are full. Executive Director Barr said that more information will be available at the August 28th Board meeting.

#### **New Hooktruck Update:**

Executive Director Barr stated that the new hooktruck should arrive mid-August. Some welding needed to be finished and presently the hook is in place.

#### Paper Shredder:

Executive Director Barr presented that the paper shredder is up for sale two places online. He had one inquiry regarding it but the potential buyer needed a shorter belt. The lease on this equipment is already done.

#### **Gravel at Moose Lodge:**

Two (2) loads of gravel were put down at Wilson School because the existing area was low and wet. Wilson School paid \$4,600.00 to put cement down over a 20 x 30 foot area. Executive Director Barr is looking for ways to get donations. He stated that Moose Lodge as well as the Township gets good traffic, and that things have been going smoothly.

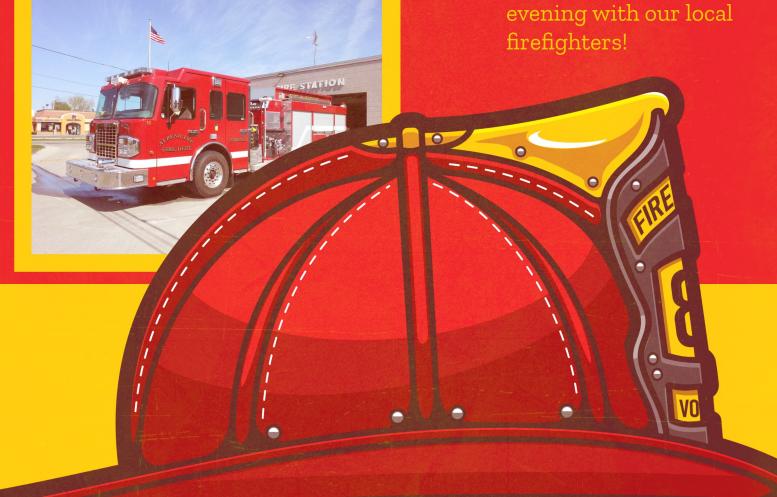

- A. Announcements for promotional opportunities shall be posted in each fire station for thirty (30) calendar days before the closing date for applicants. Applications received after the closing date and time shall not be considered.
- B. Eligibility for promotion to the position of Fire Lieutenant or Captain shall consist of the following certifications.
  - I. MMFTC FF I and II
  - 2. Fire Officer II
  - 3. Incident Command System
  - 4. Incident Safety Officer
  - 5. Minimum 3 years of full-time firefighter service.
- C. The Fire Chief shall, subject to Township Board approval, make the promotional decision(s) by selecting from the top two (2) candidates, based upon qualifications, written exam, and performance during the oral board process. The oral board panel shall consist of the Township Fire Chief, one (1) representative from the Charter Township of Alpena, and one (1) Chief Officer from an outside fire department. The Union may appoint a representative to be present as an observer. The panel shall evaluate the candidate(s) on the knowledge and requirements for the rank being considered as it pertains to the operations of the Alpena Township Fire Department.
- D. All employees receiving a promotion under this procedure shall be placed on probation for one (I) year. During the probation period, the Fire Chief shall maintain the right to revoke the promotion for just cause. The employee shall return to their formal rank/classification without loss of seniority or service time for retirement purposes.

5. Discipline. Add new Article as follows:

<u>Section I</u>. All disciplinary actions for non-probationary employees shall be for just cause and may be appealed through the grievance procedure.

<u>Section 2. Progressive Discipline</u>: The principles of corrective and progressive disciplinary action shall be used for non-probationary employees, but severe discipline, including discharge, may be appropriate for infractions or conduct of a serious nature. The following disciplinary steps exist, but do not preclude the Township from skipping steps due to the facts, incident, severity, or seriousness of the incident or conduct:

- Step I. Verbal/Written Discipline
- Step 2. Written Discipline
- Step 3. Written Discipline with or without Suspension and/or Demotion
- Step 4. Termination
- **6. Article 9, Section 8** (Military Service Credit). Amend to read "When an employee returns from military leave of absence, the total time in military service shall also be credited to the employee for the purposes of determining accumulation rates **and seniority rights.**"
- 7. Article 10, Section I (Death Leave). Rename to "Bereavement Leave"
- 8. Add to Article 7 or Article 8:
  - Time spent at a required training shall be compensated by rounding up to the nearest quarter hour.
  - For an off-duty response within an hour of the employee's scheduled shift start time for that calendar day, time spent on the call shall be rounded up to the nearest quarter hour worked.
  - An employee who responds to an emergency call on a calendar day they are not scheduled to work shall be entitled to one (I) hour of compensation for any call lasting between I-60 minutes, and shall be entitled to compensation to the nearest quarter hour for any call that lasts more than 60 minutes.
  - Except as specified in this Section, this Section supersedes any past practices or misconceptions about entitlement to pay in excess of actual hours worked.
- 9. Article 8, Section 3 (Shift Trades). Amended as follows:

Days traded with other employees shall be excluded from the computation of overtime and from the overtime pay provisions of this Article. Any two (2) members of the Department may exchange hours of duty or days off and must complete a Shift Trade Form request a trade through the Department's timekeeping system noting the days or hours of work traded and the members involved in the trade. For trades of 12 or more hours, the completed Form must be provided request must be made to

the Chief at least 24 hours before the first shift to be traded. For trades of less than 12 hours, notice must be provided to the Chief or, in the event of an emergency trade, as soon as possible after the emergency. Trades shall not cause overtime. Further, no overtime or additional compensation will be paid to employees responding to calls or appearing for a meeting or training during a shift they traded. The Township reserves the right to restrict the practice of exchanging hours as it sees fit should, in the Township's determination, any problems arise.

10. Article 8, Section 6 (First Right of Refusal) amended to remove title and read as follows:

**Except as provided below, when** any extra Fire Department-related work is needed to be done and it is in the scope of the training and expertise of the employees covered under this contract in excess of the regularly scheduled shifts, the employees covered under this contract will have that work offered to them prior to being offered to any other employee or outside contractor. Extra Fire Department-related work will be dispensed through the scheduling process defined in this contract (**Article 23**). Upon all employees covered by this contract refusing to accept such extra work, the Fire Chief (or such person is delegated) may offer the work to other Fire Department members, Township employees, contractors, or such other person who is qualified to complete the needed work.

However, the parties specifically agree to fill vacant shifts as follows:

- When a 24-hour full-time shift is open, it shall first be offered to full-time personnel.
   If no full-time personnel take the shift, it may be offered to other Fire Department personnel.
- If a 24-hour part time shift or any shift of less than 24-hours is open, it shall be first
  offered to paid on call/part-time/part paid personnel. If no such personnel take the
  shift, it may be offered to full-time personnel.
- If a vacant shift has not been filled through the above methods, the employee on duty may be required to hold over for up to 12-hours. If the remainder of the shift is not filled, the employee coming on duty may be required to come in up to 12-hours before their shift.
- II. Article 22 (Miscellaneous). Deleted.
- **12.Article 8, Section 4. (Overtime).** Transition to 14-day work period adjust overtime threshold to 106 hours beginning with the September 29, 2025 pay period.
- **13.Article 9 (Paid Time Off).** Sections 2, 4, and 5 amended to ensure compliance with the Earned Sick time Act and otherwise as follows:

Section 2 - Paid Time Off (PTO) Eligibility

Employees accumulate PTO each month they perform services for the Department qualifying pay period at a rate as described in this Article. A

qualifying pay period is active service when the employee works or receives pay for at least one-hundred (106) hours during a two-week pay period.

Section 3 – Accumulation of PTO

[no change]

Section 4 – Use of PTO

PTO may be used for vacation, sick or personal reasons, but may not be used for a holiday unless the time off is protected by the Earned Sick Time Act. Employees must use PTO for any absences and may not use any unauthorized unpaid time until all the employee's PTO is exhausted, unless an employee is off on short-term disability. Unauthorized unpaid time may result in discipline up to and including termination. PTO must be used when an employee is on FMLA leave.

#### Section 5 – Prior Notification for the Use of PTO

A calendar shall be circulated no later than November 1<sup>st</sup> of each year, starting with the senior employee and progressing through the seniority list, for purposes of requesting PTO for the next calendar year. The completed calendar shall be submitted to the Fire Chief or his/her delegate for approval no later than December 1<sup>st</sup> of each year to ensure no conflicts with PTO requests and available employees.

For any time not requested and approved in the annual calendar submission:

- 1. All PTO requests shall be made through the Department's timekeeping system.
- 2. If an employee wishes to use 72 hours or more of PTO in lieu of consecutive regularly scheduled shifts, he or she must submit that request to the Township at least ten (10) calendar days in advance for the Chief's review and approval in accordance with operational and staffing needs.
- 3. Where an employee is experiencing sickness or injury requesting time off for a reason permitted by the Earned Sick Time Act, he or she must notify the Chief at least seven (7) days in advance if the need for such time off is foreseeable and contact the Chief or his/her designee to report the absence as soon as the need for absence is known, but no later than the start of the scheduled shift if the need for such time off is not foreseeable unless emergency circumstances do not allow the employee to notify the Chief before the start of a shift.

- 4. If two or more employees contemporaneously request the same period of time off and the time off is not protected by the Earned Sick Time Act, the tie shall be broken based on seniority and operational need.
- 5. For all other requests **not protected by the Earned Sick Time Act**, the PTO will be granted on a seniority basis, provided that doing so satisfies the operational needs of the Department.
- 14. Article 11 Rename "Management Rights." Amend as follows:

The right to manage the Township Fire Department shall be vested exclusively in the Township and the Township retains the sole and exclusive right to establish and administer, implied or otherwise, all matters not specifically and expressly limited by this Agreement. This includes, without limitation, the management of the Township Fire Department, and the direction of its working forces, including but not limited to the right to plan, direct, and control Township Fire Department operations, to hire, suspend, or discharge for a cause, or transfer or relieve employees from duty because of lack of work or for other legitimate reasons, and the right to introduce new or improved working methods or facilities, are vested exclusively in the Township, provided that, in the exercise of these prerogatives, the Township shall not violate the provisions of this Agreement.

#### 15. Article 13, Section 2 (Physical Fitness) -

- Delete "even-numbered," to require physical every calendar year and
- The parties agree the Employer may establish an annual agility test and provide incentives for passage, to include at least additional PTO time.
- **16.Article 13, Section 3** (Uniforms) **Add** two polo shirts to the uniform allocation *and* New Subsection (F):

The Fire Chief, in his/her sole discretion, shall determine when uniforms, turnout gear, and other equipment must be replaced.

- **17.Article 13, Section A** (Personnel Care) amended to read "All newly hired firefighters shall meet the qualifications and requirements for full-time Fire **Officers Fighters**, as established by the Township Board **and the Michigan Fire Fighters Training Council.**"
- **18.Article 17, Section I** (Jury Duty And Witness Pay) amend final sentence to read: "His or her replacement at the Fire Station shall receive a minimum of four (4) hours pay or actual time worked, whichever is more, at **their regular rate time-and-a-half**."

19. By settling the Parties' contract, the Union agrees to withdraw all pending grievances with prejudice. Specifically, the Union will withdraw Grievances 2025-02, 2025-03, and 2025-04. Resolution of these grievances is not an admission of wrongdoing by either party. The Union also affirms that there are no other outstanding grievances and, to the extent such grievances are outstanding but not specifically mentioned in this Paragraph, they shall be deemed withdrawn with prejudice.

The Township reserves the right to add, delete, or modify any proposals at any time.

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# CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF ALPENA ALPENA COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 158 FIRE CODE ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

An ordinance to amend Charter Township of Alpena Ordinance No. 129 (the Charter Township of Alpena Fire Code Ordinance), in order to adopt the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Code (NFPA 1), and any future editions of such Code, and in order to continue to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of persons and property in the Township.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF ALPENA, ALPENA COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

#### **SECTION 1. PURPOSE.**

The purpose of this Fire Code Ordinance Amendment is to amend Charter Township of Alpena Ordinance No. 129 (the Charter Township of Alpena Fire Code Ordinance), in order to adopt the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Code (NFPA 1) and any future editions of such Code, and in order to continue to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of persons and property in the Township. The Township, by adopting Ordinance No. 129 on January 3, 2017, adopted the International Fire Code, 2015 edition (along with any future editions, and with various modifications as specified in Ordinance No. 129). The Township, by adopting this Fire Code Ordinance Amendment, will continue to recognize and enforce the International Fire Code, 2015 edition (as modified by Ordinance No. 129 and any future editions), and will, in addition, recognize and enforce the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Code (NFPA 1) and any future editions of such Code.

#### **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT OF ORDINANCE NO. 129.**

Charter Township of Alpena Ordinance No. 129 (the Fire Code Ordinance) is hereby amended to add the following Section 10 to such Ordinance:

Section 10. Adoption of National Fire Protection Association's Fire Code (NFPA 1). The National Fire Protection Association's Fire Code (NFPA 1), and any future editions of such Code, is hereby adopted by the Charter Township of Alpena. The Township will continue to recognize and enforce the International Fire Code, 2015 edition (as modified by Ordinance No. 129 and any future editions), in addition to the Fire Protection Association's Fire Code (NFPA 1) (and any future editions).

#### **SECTION 3 EFFECTIVE DATE.**

This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its publication as required by law.

#### **SECTION 4. PUBLICATION; RECORDATION; AUTHENTICATION.**

This ordinance shall be published once, in full, in a newspaper of general circulation within the boundaries of the Township, and qualified under state law to publish legal notices, within 30 days after its adoption; this ordinance shall be recorded in the record of ordinances book of the Township; and the Township

Supervisor and the Township Clerk shall authenticate this ordinance by placing his or her official signature upon this ordinance.

#### **SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.**

The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be severable, and if any clause, sentence, word, section, or provision is hereafter declared void or unenforceable for any reason by any court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect the remainder of this ordinance, which shall continue in full force and effect.

No obligations shall be incurred against, and no payment shall be made from, any appropriation account unless there is a sufficient unencumbered balance in the appropriation and sufficient funds are or will be available to meet the obligation.

The township board shall exercise supervision and control to ensure that expenditures are within appropriations, and shall not issue any purchase order for expenditures that exceed appropriations.

Expenditures must follow the procedures set forth in the township's purchasing policy which shall be established by resolution of the township board, (Reference Appendix 3, adopted 10-28-19.)

Department heads spending limit is \$500.00 without board approval, excluding the Department of Public Works and the Public Safety Department heads.

### CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF ALPENA CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND ETHICS POLICIES

#### Section 1. Public Policy.

It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Charter Township of Alpena ("the Township") that all Township officials, employees, and appointees must avoid conflicts between their private interests and those of the general public whom they serve. To enhance the faith of the people and the integrity and impartiality of all officials, employees, and appointees of the Township, it is necessary that adequate guidelines be provided for separating their roles as private citizens from their roles as public servants. Where government is based on the consent of the governed, every citizen is entitled to have complete confidence in the integrity of his or her government. Each individual official, employee, and appointee of government must help to earn, and must honor, that trust by his or her own integrity and conduct in all official duties and actions. The Township has adopted the present Conflict of Interest and Ethics Policies ("these Policies") to confirm these principles and commitments.

#### Section 2. Conduct of Township Representatives.

To accomplish the principles and commitments identified above, Township officials, employees, and appointees:

- •Shall observe both the spirit and intent of all applicable statutes, ordinances, and Township policies and procedures;
- Shall act in a fair and impartial manner;
- •Shall act consistently with the best interests of the Township, rather than for personal gain;
- •Shall practice transparency in their Township affairs, unless there is a lawful necessity for confidentiality; and
- •Shall demonstrate civility and respect in all governance processes and in delivering Township programs and services.

#### Section 3. Enforcement.

The chairs of boards, commissions, and committees; department heads; the Township Superintendent; and the Township Supervisor are directed to intervene when an individual's actions that appear to be in violation of these Policies are brought to their attention. Suspected improper actions shall be promptly

reported to the Township Supervisor. The Township Board of Trustees may impose sanctions on those individuals whose conduct does not comply with these Policies, such as reprimand, formal censure, loss of commission and committee assignments, budget restriction, termination, and other lawful sanctions as identified by the Township Board of Trustees.

#### Section 4. Compliance with Applicable Laws.

Township officials, employees, and appointees shall comply with the applicable laws related to conflicts of interest and laws regulating the conduct of public officials, employees, and appointees, including, but not limited to, Michigan Public Act 317 of 1968, MCL 15.322 et seq., which provides that a public servant shall not be a party, directly or indirectly, to any contract between himself or herself and the public entity of which he or she is an officer or employee, unless such person can demonstrate that he or she falls within an exception set forth in such Act.

#### Section 5. Actions on Behalf of Third Parties.

Township officials, employees, and appointees shall not appear on behalf of private interests of third parties before the Township Board of Trustees, or any board, commission, committee, or proceeding of the Township.

#### Section 6. Conflict of Interest.

When a decision or action would create a personal financial impact, a Township official, employee, or appointee shall promptly disclose the conflict of interest and shall not, directly or indirectly, participate in the decision or action or in any manner influence others who participate in the decision or action.

#### Section 7. Gifts and Special Benefits.

Township officials, employees, and appointees shall refrain from accepting gifts, favors, or promises of future benefits that might compromise their independence of judgment or action, or give the appearance of being compromised.

#### Section 8. Use of Township Resources.

Township officials, employees, and appointees shall not use public resources that are not available to the public in general, such as Township staff time, equipment, supplies, or facilities, for private gain or purposes.

15.321 Public servants, contracts with public entities; definitions.

Sec. 1.

As used in this act:

- (a) "Public servent" includes all persons serving any public entity, except members of the legislature and state officers who are within the provisions of section 10 of article 4 of the state constitution as implemented by legislative act.
- (b) "Public entity" means the state including all agencies thereof, any public body corporate within the state, including all agencies thereof, or any non-incorporated public body within the state of whatever nature, including all agencies thereof.

15.322 Public servant; soliciting, negotiating, renegotiating, approving, or representing a party to a contract with public entity prohibited.

Sec. 2.

- (1) Except as provided in sections 3 and 3a, a public servant shall not be a party. directly or indirectly, to any contract between himself or herself and the public entity of which he or she is an officer or employee.
- (2) Except as provided in section 3, a public servant shall not directly or indirectly solicit any contract between the public entity of which he or she is an officer or employee and any of the following:
  - (a) Him or herself.
- (b) Any firm, meaning a co-partnership or other unincorporated association, of which he or she is a partner, member, or employee.
- (c) Any private corporation in which he or she is a stockholder owning more than 1% of the total outstanding stock of any class if the stock is not listed on a stock exchange, or stock with a present total market value in excess of \$25,000,00 if the stock is listed on a stock exchange or of which he or she is a director, officer, or employee.
  - (d) Any trust of which he or she is a beneficiary or trustee.
- (3) In regard to a contract described in subsection (2), a public servant shall not do either of the following:
- (a) Take any part in the negotiations for such a contract or the renegotiation or amendment of the contract, or in the approval of the contract.
  - (b) Represent either party in the transaction.

Sec. 3.

- (1) Section 2 does not apply to either of the following:
- (a) A public servant who is paid for working an average of 25 hours per week or less for a public entity.
- (b) A public servant who is an employee of a public community college, junior college, or state college or university.
- (2) A contract as defined in and limited by section 2 involving a public entity and a public servant described in subsection (1) shall meet all of the following requirements:
- (a) The public servant promptly discloses any pecuniary interest in the contract to the official body that has power to approve the contract, which disclosure shall be made a matter of record in its official proceedings. Unless the public servant making the disclosure will directly benefit from the contract in an amount less than \$250.00 and less than 5% of the public cost of the contract and the public servant files a sworn affidavit to that effect with the official body or the contract is for emergency repairs or services, the disclosure shall be made in either of the following manners:
- (i) The public servant promptly discloses in writing to the presiding officer, or if the presiding officer is the public servant who is a party to the contract, to the celerk, the pecuniary interest in the contract at least 7 days prior to the meeting at which a

vote will be taken. The disclosure shall be made public in the same manner as a public meeting notice.

- (ii) The public servant discloses the pecuniary interest at a public meeting of the official body. The vote shall be taken at a meeting of the official body held at least 7 days after the meeting at which the disclosure is made. If the amount of the direct benefit to the public servant is more than \$5,000.00, disclosure must be made as provided under this subparagraph.
- (b) The contract is approved by a vote of not less than 2/3 of the full membership of the approving body in open session without the vote of the public servant making the disclosure.
- (c) The official body discloses the following summary information in its official minutes:
  - (i) The name of each party involved in the contract.
- (ii) The terms of the contract, including duration, financial consideration between parties, facilities of services of the public entity included in the contract, and the nature and degree of assignment of employees of the public entity for fulfillment of the contract.
  - (iii) The nature of any pecuniary interest.
- (3) This section and section 2 do not prevent a public servant from making or participating in making a governmental decision to the extent that the public servant's participation is required by law. If 2/3 of the members are not eligible under this act to vote on a contract or to constitute a quorum, a member may be counted for purposes of a quorum and may vote on the contract if the member will directly benefit from the contract in an amount less than \$250.00 and less than 5% of the public cost of the contract and the member files a sworn affidavit to that effect with the official body. The affidavit shall be made a part of the public record of the official proceedings. As used in this subsection, "governmental decision" means a determination, action, vote, or disposition upon a motion, proposal, recommendation, resolution, ordinance, order, or measure on which a vote by members of a local legislative or governing body of a public entity is required and by which a public body affectuates or formulates public policy.

In the case of the corporation, the actual knowledge must be that of a person or body finally approving the contract for the corporation. All actions to avoid any contract hereunder shall be brought within 1 year after discovery of circumstances suggesting a violation of this act. In order to meet the ends of justice any such decree shall provide for the reimbursement of any person, firm, corporation or trust for the reasonable value of all moneys, goods, materials, labor or services furnished under the contract, to the extent that the public entity has benefited thereby. This provision shall not prohibit the parties from arriving at an amicable settlement.
- (2) Negotiable and nonnegotiable bonds, notes or evidences of indebtedness, whether heretofore or hereafter issued, in the hands of purchasers for value, shall not be void provideble by reason of this act or of any previous statute, charter or rule of law.

#### OFFICE PET POLICY

1.1 The County of Alpena (the County) is responsible for assuring the health and safety of all employees. In keeping with this objective, the County has formulated a policy balancing these concerns with the desire to promote a positive employment experience by allowing appropriate pets in the office. A pet may be allowed in the office if its health and behavior are acceptable within an office setting, and if it does not adversely affect office operations.

- 1.2 A pet owner wishing to bring a pet to the office should first obtain written permission from his or her immediate supervisor if they are an elected official, or if their immediate supervisor is not an elected official, the county administrator. Any decision to allow a pet to come to the office, or to exclude a pet from the office, will be made by the owner's immediate supervisor if they are an elected official, or if their immediate supervisor is not an elected official, the county administrator. That decision will be final, except in cases involving service animals, which should be referred to the Human Resources department.
- 1.3 An employee who requires the help of a service animal (defined by 28 CFR 36.104 as "any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability") will be permitted to bring a service animal to the office, provided that the animal's presence does not create a danger to others and does not impose an undue hardship upon the company.
- 1.4 The privilege of bringing a pet to work is subordinate to the health, safety, and comfort of persons who may come into contact with animals at the office. An animal may be excluded from the office if it:

- causes any person to experience allergic reactions, fear, or any other physical or psychological discomfort;
- o distracts any employee from their work; or
- o reduces any employee's productivity or quality of work.
- 1.5 Any individual with a grievance regarding an animal at the office should bring the matter to the attention of the owner's immediate supervisor, if they are an elected official, or the county administrator if they are not an elected official, as well as Human Resources.

In addition, the following animals may not be brought to the workplace:

- o sick animals (unless walved by Human Resources);
- o animals with fleas or any disease that is communicable to other animals in the office or to humans:
- o animals that have not been properly vaccinated, or that have internal or external parasites:
- o dogs that bark or behave aggressively; or
- o animals that foul the inside or outside of the building;
- animals that have not been spayed or neutered will not be permitted to come to the
  office in season.
- 1.6 All dogs must be leashed at all times when outside the main office or enclosed area. All animals must be in the continuous full control of their owners. They should be in the physical presence of the owner, in the owner's office, or in the space around the owner's desk at all times.
- 1.7 Owners are expected to clean up, completely and immediately, after their animals.

  Food and water dishes must be removed from the floor and stored overnight. Food must be kept in a sealed container during non-business hours. Toys or accessories must be kept in a collected area (box, bin, etc.) during non-business hours.
- 1.8 During the summer months, especially for breeds that shed, the owner will be responsible to assist in maintaining the floors and ensuring the office space is kept tidy.
- 1.9 An employee who brings an animal to the office is completely and solely liable for any injuries or any damage to personal property caused by the animal. Any repair or cleaning/maintenance costs incurred by an animal will be charged in full to the owner.
- 2.0 The County of Alpena may, at its discretion, require animal owner to maintain a liability insurance policy covering damage or injuries caused by the animal while at the office. The County may specify minimum coverage amounts under such a policy and may require the owner to pay for such coverage.

- 2.1 The County of Alpena is not liable for loss of, or injury to, any animal brought to the office.
- 2.2 Any animal that has had to quarantine due to biting will not be permitted.
- 2.3 The County of Alpena, acting through the county administrator, reserves the right to revoke this policy and ban animals on county property, by employees, during business hours at any time.
- 2.4 Along with previously listed requirements, the following must be provided to Human Resources prior to an office pet being allowed in your department or workspace:
  - o Written consent by all staff within the office
  - o Written consent by the Grounds & Maintenance Superintendent
  - Necessary documentation, including:
    - Listing of type, breed (or description of breed is unavailable), approximate age, sex, and name
    - o License
    - o Proof of vaccination
    - o Proof of spay/neuter
    - o insurance (if required)
- 2.5 Owners may be held accountable for any injuries or damage resulting from their pet.





### Risk Management Moment

### **Emotional Support Animals vs Service Animals in the workplace**

It is important to understand the differences between an emotional support animal and a service animal. A service animal is trained to perform specific tasks and is allowed in public places to support a disabled person e.g. a guide dog. Whereas an emotional support animal provides support, care, and companionship to someone with mental health problems.

#### **Emotional Support Animals**

An emotional support animal provides the comfort and support many people need when they are suffering room mental health issues. This helps their owners cope with everyday life and their condition better.

#### Service Animals

Employers in Michigan have no legal obligation to allow "Emotional Support Animals" in the workplace. According to the ADA, the only exception would be if the job applicant or employee requires a "Service Animal" for assistance.

The Americans with Disabilities Act protects those with a disability and allows service animals in public places but does not support emotional support animals in Michigan. For employment, most workplaces do not allow you to bring your animal into the workplace unless it is a trained service animal. This means it is not against the law for an employer to deny access upon an employee request to allow an emotional support animal.

#### **Employer Considerations and liability mitigation**

If an employer should consider allowing an ESA in the workplace, the animal needs to be prescribed by a licensed mental health professional to a person with a disabling mental illness. Michigan dog bite and leash laws have strict liability for dog owners if they bite someone, making the dog owner responsible. As a precautionary measure, the employer should require the employee to provide proof of liability insurance from their homeowner or renters insurance company along with current veterinary shot records.

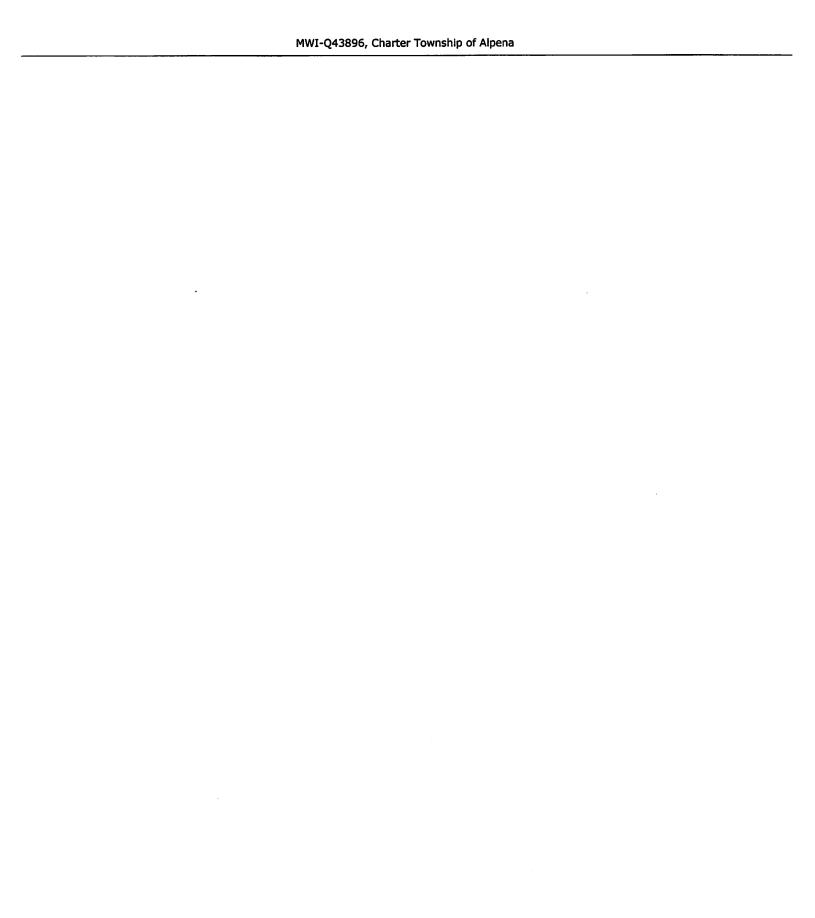

# CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF ALPENA FIRE DEPARTMENT MILLAGE PROPOSAL (AUGUST PRIMARY 2026)

The safety and well-being of every resident in our Township is paramount. Our Fire Department plays a crucial role in protecting lives, property, and our community as a whole. To ensure that our fire protection services remain effective, reliable, and capable of meeting the evolving needs of our growing Township, I am proposing a **remove and replace millage** for fire protection.

This proposal involves **removing the existing 1.4953 millage** dedicated to fire protection and **replacing it with a new millage of 3.475 for 3 years**. I understand that any request for increased taxation requires careful consideration and a clear explanation. Therefore, I want to transparently outline the critical reasons driving this proposal:

#### 1. Addressing the Increasing Demands on Our Fire Department:

- **Growing Population and Service Area:** Our Township has experienced growth, leading to an increased number of households and businesses that our Fire Department is responsible for protecting. This expansion naturally increases the frequency and complexity of emergency calls.
- **Broader Scope of Services:** Modern fire departments are no longer solely focused on extinguishing fires. They are increasingly involved in emergency medical services (EMS), hazardous materials response, technical rescues, and community risk reduction initiatives. These expanded responsibilities require additional training, equipment, and personnel.
- Aging Infrastructure and Equipment: Like all essential services, our Fire Department relies on vehicles, equipment, and facilities that require regular maintenance, repair, and eventual replacement. The current millage is insufficient to keep pace with these critical needs, leading to potential risks in operational efficiency and firefighter safety.

#### 2. Maintaining and Enhancing the Quality of Fire Protection Services:

- Ensuring Adequate Staffing Levels: To provide timely and effective response, our Fire Department needs sufficient staffing, including both full-time and well-trained volunteer personnel. The proposed millage will allow us to maintain and potentially enhance staffing levels to meet national safety standards and ensure rapid response times.
- Investing in Modern Equipment and Technology: Firefighting and emergency response rely on specialized and often expensive equipment, including fire trucks, protective gear, communication systems, and life-saving tools. The increased funding will enable us to replace aging and outdated equipment with modern, reliable technology that improves firefighter safety and operational effectiveness.
- **Providing Comprehensive Training:** Continuous and specialized training is essential for our firefighters and EMS personnel to stay up-to-date on the latest techniques,

protocols, and best practices. The additional funding will support enhanced training programs, ensuring our first responders are prepared for a wide range of emergencies.

### 3. Fiscal Responsibility and Long-Term Sustainability:

- Current Millage Limitations: The existing 1.4953 millage, established August 2018, no longer generates sufficient revenue to adequately fund the current and future needs of our Fire Department. The cost of equipment, personnel, and operational expenses has significantly increased over time.
- **Preventing Future Deficiencies:** By proactively addressing the funding gap now, we can avoid more significant and potentially disruptive shortfalls in the future. This responsible approach ensures the long-term sustainability of our fire protection services.
- Protecting Property Values and Insurance Rates: A well-equipped and efficiently run Fire Department contributes to lower insurance rates for homeowners and businesses and helps maintain property values within our Township. Investing in fire protection is an investment in our community's economic well-being.

#### **Impact on Taxpayers:**

I understand that this proposed increase will have an impact on taxpayers. For a property with a taxable value of \$100,000, the current millage levy is approximately \$149.53 per year. Under the proposed 3.475 millage, this would increase to approximately \$348.00 per year, an additional \$198.47 annually.

I believe this investment is a necessary and responsible step to ensure the continued safety and security of our Township. The increased funding will directly support the essential services provided by our Fire Department, protecting lives, property, and the overall well-being of our community.

Failure of this remove and replace request would continue the 1.4953 millage until it ends December of 2027. At that time another millage will have to be requested and passed to continue any type of Fire services to residents. The following are potential consequences.

#### **Immediate and Direct Impacts:**

- **Significant Reduction in Fire Department Funding:** The most immediate and significant consequence would be a drastic reduction in the Fire Department's operating budget. The existing 1.4953 millage, which currently provides a portion of their funding, would be eliminated. Without the new 3.475 millage in place to replace it, the department would face a substantial shortfall.
- **Potential for Layoffs and Staff Reductions:** To cope with a significantly reduced budget, the Township and Fire Department would likely be forced to consider personnel reductions, including firefighters and potentially administrative staff. This would directly impact the department's ability to respond effectively and maintain current staffing levels.

- **Possible Reduction in Services:** With fewer personnel and a smaller budget, the level of services the Fire Department can provide would likely decrease. This could manifest in several ways:
  - Slower Response Times: Fewer on-duty personnel could lead to delays in responding to emergency calls.
  - Reduced Coverage: Certain areas of the Township might experience longer response times or reduced availability of fire and emergency medical services.
  - Limitations on Specialized Services: If the department offers specialized services (e.g., medical first responder, technical rescue), these could be curtailed or eliminated.
- **Deferred Maintenance and Equipment Replacement:** Capital expenditures for maintaining and replacing aging equipment (fire trucks, protective gear) would likely be postponed or canceled due to a lack of funds. This could lead to a decline in the operational readiness and safety of the department over time.
- Impact on Insurance Ratings: A poorly funded fire department can negatively impact the Township's Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating. A lower rating could lead to higher property insurance premiums for residents and businesses within the Township.

#### **Longer-Term Implications:**

- Increased Risk to Public Safety: The cumulative effect of reduced funding, staffing, and equipment maintenance would ultimately increase the risk to the safety and wellbeing of Township residents and property.
- **Difficulty in Meeting Emergency Demands:** The department might struggle to effectively handle multiple incidents simultaneously or large-scale emergencies.
- Challenges in Attracting and Retaining Personnel: A department facing budget cuts and uncertainty may find it difficult to attract qualified new recruits and retain experienced personnel, further exacerbating staffing issues.
- Potential for Increased Mutual Aid Reliance: The Township might become more reliant on neighboring fire departments for assistance, which could strain those departments and potentially lead to slower overall response times in mutual aid situations.
- **Future Financial Strain:** Addressing the consequences of underfunding the fire department in the long run (e.g., replacing severely outdated equipment, rebuilding staffing levels) could be more costly in the future than approving the proposed millage now.
- **Erosion of Community Confidence:** A decline in the quality and reliability of fire protection services could erode public trust in the Township government.

In summary, the failure of the proposed millage would likely have significant and detrimental consequences for fire protection services in Alpena Township, potentially jeopardizing the safety of residents and property and creating long-term challenges for the community.

#### **Moving Forward:**

I am committed to being transparent and accountable in the use of these funds. The Township Board will ensure that the millage revenue is dedicated solely to fire protection services and will provide regular updates to the community on how these funds are being utilized.

We encourage all residents to carefully consider the information presented and recognize the critical role our Fire Department plays in our Township. We believe that this remove and replace millage is a vital investment in the safety and future of our community.
